BOB JONES DIES OF INJURY IN MINE FALL

Robert (Bob) Jones died Sat-
 urday as a hospital plane piloted
 by Don Wonders landed in Gun-
 nison bringing him to Commu-
 nity Hospital for treatment of his
 injuries.

Mr. Jones was fatally injured
 in an accident at the Ute-Ulay
 Mine on Henson Creek above
 Lake City.

He and John Wagner were carry-
 ing a timber along the top of a
 bulkhead when a pneumatic drill
 or stoper, was actuated and fell
 toward the two men. Mr. Wagner
 said Mr. Jones apparently stum-
 bled and fell into a muck chute.
 He fell 120 feet to the bottom of
 the chute. Mr. Wagner also fell,
 but grabbed a spike driven into a
 timber of the bukhead and was
 saved from the long fall.

Mr. Jones was immediately re-
 moved from the mine and taken
 to Lake City where Dr. Donald
 Petersen from Gunnison had been
 flown to give medical treatment.
 Although Mr. Jones remained un-
 conscious his condition indicated
 he could be removed to Gunnison
 for treatment of fractured bones
 and a hospital plane had been
 brought for that purpose. Don
 Wonders said Mr. Jones was
 breathing as they landed at the
 Gunnison airport, but G. Lewis
 Miller said he was dead when the
 Ambulance arived to take him to
 the hospital. Dr. Petersen return-
 ed to Gunnison in the car of
 Mine Manager William Tobey,

since flying conditions at Lake
 City would not permit two pas-
 sengers in the plane.

An inquest, originally requested
 by Mrs. Lee Jones, widow of the
 victim, was cancelled when Mrs.
 Jones said she was satisfied the
 death was accidental.

G. A. Franz, of Ouray, in-
 spector for the district, came to
 Lake City Saturday evening to
 inspect the scene and said the
 death was the result of an acci-
 dent.

Mr. Jones was an experienced
 miner although he had worked
 only four days at the Ute-Ulay.
 He has worked in mines all over
 this area. He also acted as a hunt-
 ing guide during the big-game
 seasons.

Funeral services were held
 Tuesday afternoon at the Miller
 Funeral Home. Rev. N. O. Brooks
 conducted the services. Burial was
 in the Masons and Odd Fellows
 Cemetery.

Robert Bradford Jones was
 born Oct. 22, 1904 at Canon City,
 son of Robert Jones and the for-
 mer Jennie Hopkirk. He lived all
 his life in this part of Colorado.
 Besides his wife, he is survived by
 his nine-months-old daughter,
 his mother, Mrs. Jennie Sifers and
 three half-sisters, Mrs. Edith
 Johnson of Denver, Gladys Sifers
 of Gunnison, Alice Sifers of Pu-
 eble and a half-brother, James
 Sifers, of Leadville.
